- = to accept the results or punishment for what you did

- = dealing with a very difficult situation or a lot of pressure
- = it's your turn to make a decision or take action
- = in trouble or in a difficult situation
- = to stop trying, to give up after failing or getting tired of trying

- = to do or say something to get more time before you must decide or act
- = to change the rules or conditions after something has already started
